Medicines Optimisation Pharmacy Assistants on Wards (MO ATO) Project Lead Bilal Topia & Israr Baig

Background

Patients were being transferred from ward to ward – in particular from assessment units (AMU) onto wards – but their medicines were not always being transferred at the same time. This issue resulted in missed doses, duplicate prescriptions, lost medicines and time spent by ward staff in tracing medicines, writing new prescriptions and traveling backwards and forwards to Pharmacy to collect urgent medicines

Method

Employ Medicines Optimisation Pharmacy Assistants (MO ATO) to complete the following tasks each day (Monday – Friday):

- 9am transfer all medication left on AMU to patients bed side locker on new ward
- 12pm all medications ordered by pharmacy for patients on AMU dispensed, accuracy checked and delivered to ward and placed in patients bed side locker

This was piloted successfully on AMU in GRH for over 4 months resulting in a safer and more efficient service to AMU.

Aim

To reduce the amount of medication being left behind on AMU when patients are



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transferred to a new ward





Next Steps

- Business case for funding approved and additional staff recruited
- Implementation to the following wards commenced August 19 AMU, 9B, 8B, 7A, 5A
- Subsequent wards to be introduced in a phased approach

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
